

Isaac & Rebekah

- I. Introduction
 - A. Gen 24:2 – Abraham sent oldest servant of his house to find a wife for Isaac.
 - 1. Could it have been Eliazar (15:2)
 - 2. Gen 15:2: 2 But Abram said, “Lord God, what will You give me, seeing I go childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?”
 - 3. Gen 24:10: Went to Mesopotamia, to the city of Nahor (also Haran) – only time “Nahor” mentioned as a city.
- II. A Bride for Isaac (Gen 24:61-67)
 - A. 24:67: Isaac loved his wife. One of few times in the Bible mention of romantic love.
 - B. Sarah died in Chap 23. 22:67 says she comforted him.
 - C. Gen 25:20: Isaac was 40 when he married Rebekah
- III. Twins Born (Gen 25:20-28)
 - A. Gen 25:1-7: Abraham remarried and had more kids, but he sent them away from Isaac
 - B. Gen 25:8: Abraham dies
 - C. Gen 25:9: Isaac and Ishmael bury him
 - D. Gen 25:21: Rebekah was barren. Isaac pleaded, the Lord granted his plea.
 - 1. Jacob: Supplanter
 - 2. Esau: Hairy; Edom: Red
 - 3. BTW Isaac: He (God) Who is laughing (now)
 - 4. 2 sons, examples of younger getting favor over older?
 - a) Eve (Gen 4)
 - b) Tamar/Judah (Gen 38:27-30)
 - c) Joseph (Gen 48)
 - d) Prodigal son & brother?
 - 5. Gen 25:27: contrasting temperaments: Jacob & Esau vs Cain & Abel (see also 27:41: 41 So Esau hated Jacob because of the blessing with which his father blessed him, and Esau said in his heart, “The days of mourning for my father are at hand; then I will kill my brother Jacob.”)
- IV. Rivalry (Gen 25:29-34; 27:41-45)
 - A. Gen 25:8: Rivalry between sons, also rivalry between parents?
 - B. Rivalry reached a head when Esau wanted some stew because he thought he’d die.
 - 1. NT cautions against having any fornicator or profane individual among Christians.
 - 2. Hebrews 12:16-17: (Renew Your Spiritual Vitality) 12 Therefore strengthen the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees, 13 and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be dislocated, but rather be healed. 14 Pursue peace with all people, and holiness, without which no one will see the Lord: 15 looking carefully lest anyone fall short of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up cause trouble, and by this many become defiled; 16 lest there be any fornicator or profane person like Esau, who for one morsel of food sold his birthright. 17 For you know that afterward, when he wanted to inherit the blessing, he was rejected, for he found no place for repentance, though he sought it diligently with tears.
 - C. (transition to conclusion) Gen 26: Lord appeared to Isaac and renewed the oath to give him land.
- V. Conclusion
 - A. Family is important
 - B. Isaac/Rebekah were a “common home” (barrenness, favoritism, rivalry between sons, etc)
 - C. Theme: Wait on the Lord
 - D. Last 2 sentences from the book: “Through this family and the generations that followed, God laid the foundation for the nation of Israel and the coming of the Messiah. Their story reminds us that God often works most powerfully when ordinary homes surrender to Him.”
